search of a better future.
Originally from Pretoria,
during his childhood, Hardus faced the turbulent post-apartheid era in South Africa Despite the country's natural

beauty and the warmth of its people, political and economic challenges were enormous.

The inequalities bred by apartheid cast a long shadow, leaving many trapped in a cycle

of poverty and uncertainty. Driven by the desire for change and a better life for his family, Hardus boldly decided to move to New Zealand

Armed with degrees in theology and architecture and his wife's profession as a

We decided to come over "We decided to come over and open a new chapter, be part of a new society and community," he said. Challenges and sacrifices marked their journey.

We came with our backpacks and some clothes,

and that was it. I still have photos of us sleeping on the floor on my phone." he said.

From the stress of financial uncertainty to the mixed reactions of friends and family to their decision, they faced each obstacle with resilience and determination.

They arrived in Wellington,

where they quickly found work in their respective careers and began to build a new life.

Unfortunately, shortly after embarking on this new life, his father died

Hardus found solace in running, using it to cope with the loss and, unexpectedly, opening up an unimaginable

opportunity,
Collaborating with people he
met along the way, Trail Athlete
(www.trailathlete.net) was started, coaching runners driven by a shared passion for the sport and communitybuilding.
After their time in Wellington

and shortly after the birth of their son, Hardus and Frieda decided to move to Wanaka Surrounded by breathtaking

landscapes, they found a sense of belonging in the community. Hardus embraced new job

opportunities and joined the fire brigade "I really enjoy it. It's giving

me the opportunity to volunteer and contribute to society. "The cool thing about it is

that you are making a

difference." For Hardus, security is essential, especially with a young child and another baby "It's a safe and good community, People care about each other

The family's journey has not been without its ups and downs, but despite everything, they are grateful for the opportunities that come their way in New Zealand, now with a new job in Queenstown on the horizon.

"God looks out for us. There have been so many miracles during this journey that I didn't

doubt his existence," Hardus story is a testament to the resilience of immigrants and the power of hope and determination in the face of adversity. From humble beginnings in
